



Several months ago, two brothers who use our library donated two Nintendo Switch video games with the desire they be made available for checkout by our library patrons. We ran with their idea and, utilizing donated gift funds, purchased 20 more Switch games, which can now be check out from the Teen Room! Patrons can check out 2 games on their card at a time, for 3 weeks. For the time being we will not be renewing beyond that.

We've also received two more gaming donations—mini Nintendo (NES) and Super Nintendo (SNES) gaming systems, with controllers and power plugs. These come preloaded with classic games such as the original Super Mario Brothers, The Legend of Zelda, and their sequels. Our goal is to have them available for checkout this fall—more details to come in terms of checkout procedures and due dates.

Fleeting, Golden Light

In *Owen Wister Out West His Journals and Letters* edited by Fanny Kemble Wister, a book you can find in our library, Wister describes what he sees in the Powder River County. On our prairies there is a fleeting, golden light at the end of the day that is just breathtaking. I believe he is telling of this phenomenon. I also agree with Mr. Wister, "that you can hardly make a journal too full."

Owen Wister is the author of The Virginian. In this classic western novel, the Virginian gets his man at Buffalo's Occidental. Wister made several trips to Wyoming and both his novel and his journals are terrific local history reads. Sharing this from his journal entry which begins, At Tisdale's (TTT ranch), June 13, 1891 (pgs. 103-104)...

"We killed a rattlesnake. We saw a few antelope. Powder River is a beastly stream. But Tisdale's ranch stands where good country begins. There are cottonwoods in the bottoms, and the river twists out of the dreary empty plains here and gets among pleasant sunny bluffs, and timber lies only a little back from it on steep hills...I spent the night, and am now much at leisure-very pleasant delightful leisure. Rose at five, breakfast five-thirty. Then the four men went off in various directions. Cook's at the house. My scrub is loafing by himself, as I am. The day was cool till lately, with the clear sky and the 'light that never was on sea or land.' This can transfigure even such hopeless godforsaken country as this at the south edge of Tisdale's, and make it seem like a piece of Paradise, though a flat one. Wish I could draw. Writing is so wretched. But I am bound on this trip to lose nothing. Former experience has taught that you can hardly make a journal too full. I hope I shall be able to keep it up and get down in notes, anyhow, all the things that are peculiar to this life and country."
